CURATORS REPORT

The Historical Society owns a "democrat", but not a republican. The buggy, which is displayed on the front porch, is typical of the wagons which were popular in the late 19th century. The name democrat refers its use by the common class of working people. It was used for transportation and for utilitarian purposes. It is defined as a light uncovered wagon with two or more seats. To provide a more comfortable ride there are springs under the box. In some wagons, there are also springs under the seats. If you compare it to the automobiles of today, it would be the mid-size car of its era. (Information from "Country" Magazine). Our democrat wagon was built by the Studebaker Company of South Bend, Indiana. A plaque on the back indicates G. F. Funke of Akron, NY sold it.

Each year, the Historical Society receives between 30 and 50 different artifacts. 2003 is proving to be no exception. Ask any member for a listing of some the latest items received by the Historical Society. These items add to our collections and add to what we know about Alden's history and the way people lived and worked and played.

Everything is recorded with as much information as we can obtain. Everyone is welcome to check out the codes on the items and then look at the Accession forms for information on background of the items.

Carousel Restoration

Last September, our toy carousel was turned over to the Art Restoration department at Buffalo State College. Work was needed on the dolls, the carriages and the mechanism. The dolls have been restored. Work on the rest of the parts will continue through the fall.

SCHOOL HOUSE

Ringing of the bell started each day at the Henske Road Schoolhouse.

Built circa 1834 it sat on a hill across from the Henske Farm (now Foss farm) on Henske Rd.

It schooled local children until 1929 and held school board meetings until 1950.

In 1976 it was donated and moved to the Alden Town Park by the Henske family for display during the bicentennial.

Restoration began in 2002 and is a work in progress yet again this year with the support of private grants, local business people, clubs and organizations
